To keep this succinct I tried to think of three words to describe Alasdair... But before I say what they are, I just want to share a few personal recollections and thoughts - he was one of the people after my dad and my husband who has made a big impact on me.

The soul of politeness, always keen to meet and welcome new people, a good judge of character, very good at finding the right people for roles to help others, Alasdair was horrifically incompetent at diary management, he had the twinkliest eyes and the cheekiest giggle ...

We didn't see so much of the Alasdair we knew in his prime in recent years...for in his prime he was quite for midable!

Not long after I started at the Hospice, his finance director at the time, Catherine Elgey, said to me "it's okay you can disagree with Alasdair, you just have to get past that moment when you're in fear of your life!"

He actually didn't have any airs and graces – he was always the same, even though achieving exalted positions ... We worked together for more than 25 years for the Hospice, but I knew him before that as a family friend, and through the NSPCC who made him an honorary life member (and they just did not do that for anyone believe me)... So we go back probably over 40 years.

We know he loved little sayings that didn't waste words that he picked up on Boards, in management courses and in high powered meetings with General Motors like "my dear, You should have leadership vision and grip!" and he loved passing them on.

He was a very, very caring person but many of his acts of kindness were not known to the general public and to the officials who gave him recognition for more high profile work... I know about his visits to comfort people who he didn't even know personally. He arranged for essential nursing staff to be picked up and brought into the Hospice then driven home afterwards when everywhere was deep in snow, often doing some of the driving himself. He often lent people vehicles when they needed them and it wasn't to get a sale... I bought an Astra from Alasdair and it was "alright" but I changed it and for ages afterwards his greeting was "How are you and how is your Toyota?"

Actually You didn't pick up his South African accent all that much but it was there .. in expressions like: my dear Jane or Dear Peter and ... how are you and how are your dishy daughters.

He applauded and encouraged both of my girls in their careers and particularly Harriet who he followed up inviting her to piano Society concerts so that she could meet some of the top international players and of course he sponsored all of those at the Art Centre and it was a brilliant time! He supported the arts "big time" as he would say... and so, so many good causes.

There are not that many people who you can say will leave a big hole in the world, but Alasdair is one of those.

He was a presence!

Known for his suits, and as the "stripey man" by many at the Hospice, I bought him a pair of pinstripe slippers one Christmas which he loved. I hope he's wearing them now. You always knew when Val was away, because if you met him in Sainsbury's, he had various items of clothing that just didn't go together - but I think he celebrated that a little bit!


He never minded making fun of himself - I had one hilarious conversation advising him on wearing tights for his vice lieutenant investiture! On another occasion, he spent a big part of one of our early trustee meeting, when we only had deckchairs to sit on, sporting a knotted hanky on his head.

The list of causes and projects he has supported to benefit this community and the wider region and to promote the North in such a positive way is too big to read through now, as evinced by all the online tributes. To name two very close to home:




I for one am very thankful for his mentorship and friendship over the years. I will miss him and I am sure that these sentiments are echoed by so many of us in Rotary.
